Applied Stage Two - Aboriginal Research Methodology for Aboriginal People

(The course will focus on Applied Research and or the development of a Project Plan or Funding Application. Participants are required to register by November 5 in order to satisfy the course requirements)

Aim

The Aboriginal Research Methods for Aboriginal People Stage Two, builds on the learning outcomes of participants, who have completed the Stage One Introduction to Aboriginal Research Methods. The Course aims to give Aboriginal people access to new knowledge into how research, and evaluation can be undertaken from a sympathetic, respectful, and ethically correct Aboriginal perspective. The Program will target Aboriginal people across disciplines who are living and working in the Kimberley region, and are interested in increasing their knowledge and understanding of applied Aboriginal Research.

The three day (3) Professional Development Program targets the Aboriginal person who is looking to enhance their knowledge and practice in research that has relevance to Aboriginal people. It is also available to those who are already out there in a range of industries who may be engaging with Aboriginal research. The program acknowledges Aboriginal people have a wealth of lived experiences and collective wisdom. This life learning experiences will be promoted and will be a critical part of sharing the engagement and impact of Aboriginal research on Aboriginal people.

Learning Outcomes

1. Reflect on current research practice through guidance of experienced Aboriginal researchers to develop a deeper understanding of applied Aboriginal research and evaluation methodologies that promote ways of working collaboratively with Aboriginal people and communities.
2. Strengthen capacity to analyse information through critical reading skills to develop and articulate world views.
3. Reflect on the different ways data is collected and analysed using multiple methods of applied Aboriginal research practice.
4. Increase knowledge and practice of data sovereignty and the protection of Aboriginal knowledge and practice.
5. Increase knowledge and the capacity to identify and apply grant funding criteria to community identified research projects and programs.

6. Strengthen applied research skills through information technology search of The University of Notre Dame library and the Nulungu Research Institute data bases to increase participant awareness of information, electronic journals and publications.
