The module can support health professionals to:

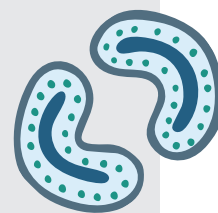
- understand legal considerations when caring for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples, their families, and communities at the end of life, and

It can also support health services and organisations to meet national safety and quality standards relevant to end of life care for Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples.
